Elbert K. Pollard

Barbara Owen of Grand Prairie owns Barbara's Cake and Cookies. She is located in the old Weber's Dew Drop Inn building at 421 W. Main Street, which is an historical marker #47. Her home in GP is historical marker #40.

Barbara's father was the late Elbert K. Pollard, Jr..

Mr. Pollard was nominated for the honor of a veteran who lived in Grand Prairie and did something significant in the Army. He was chosen as one of two applicants to have a federal building at the old NAS Dallas named in his honor.

Mr. Pollard served in the armed forces for 20 years

and received 7 battle stars during his tour of duty. In a conversation with Barbara, she says, "Daddy started in the Army because he was too short for the Navy. He said he was 5'4", but at 5'2", I was taller than he". His comrades lovingly referred to him as "Shorty". Later during WWII, the Navy lowered the height requirement so Mr. Pollard signed up and spent the remainder of his tour in that branch.

While serving in the Army, Mr. Pollard was stationed on the Italian Peninsula in the battle of

Cassina where he served as a runner. During this tour of duty, Mr. Pollard was given the surrender papers from Germany to hand off to General Patton and personally delivered them.

Mr. Pollard learned to speak 5 different languages. He loved life and was often the life of the party. He was an avid fisherman and bought his grandsons fishing poles and spent many hours teaching them to fish.

Barbara Owen said, "Daddy would have been so proud and humbled by

this honor. He loved and honored our American flag and taught everyone around him to respect it in the same manner".

As reported above, SGT Bob Shanks was chosen for the NAS name sake. However, soldiers like Mr. Pollard and Sgt Shanks both deserve our respect and we hold

the same respect for both of these fine gentlemen.

Mr. Pollard passed away on March 22, 2005. He is missed greatly by his family and friends. He left a legacy of which we can all be proud.

“The Frenchman, The Adventist, The Farmer”

My father, Faucher Franklin Liggett, was born in Grand Prairie, Texas, on January 10, 1912, into a family of French and French Canadian immigrants who settled in the Grand Prairie area. He graduated from Grand Prairie High School and stayed in Grand Prairie to become a wholesale dairyman. While in school, he met Martha Underwood Liggett whom he married in 1935. Martha was the daughter of Sidney T, Underwood and Lillian Mercer, who also lived in Grand Prairie for many years. Martha Liggett taught children in various school and private settings for about 35 years. She was best known for teaching corrective speech, remedial reading, and expression (public speaking) in her home before these skills were taught in the public schools. Faucher followed in his family’s tradition of agrarian occupation and spent most of his life being a dairy farmer. Being forced into retirement when the “Toll Road” (Interstate 30) was developed, he then began a second career as an employee of Millar Drug Company. He retired from this career when he was 79 years old.

Faucher’s parents were George F. Liggett and Dina Scheppler Liggett who built a home on the family farm, now know as 322 Hill Street and, later, the home at 401 College Street, which is now a medical office. The home at 401 College Street was one of the first brick homes built in Grand Prairie. Dina’s parents, Alphonse Scheppler and Mary Agnes Faucher Scheppler

came from the Alsace Loraine Region of France where the farming tradition began. The Schepplers migrated to the United States where they were converted to the Seventh Day Adventist Religion while living in Illinois. Alphonse and Agnes returned to France when Dina was around three years old to serve as missionaries for the Seventh Day Adventist Church. The family helped organize the Grand Prairie Adventist Church. The Adventist Church was dear to the hearts of the Liggetts and the Schepplers. The Grand Prairie Adventist Church building sits on farm land that was donated by the Liggett and Scheppler families.

George and Dina Liggett had four children who maintained their residence in Grand Prairie. The oldest child was Varina Liggett Hight. She was married to Ewing Irving (Stump) Hight, the father of Marjorie Hight Spikes Copeland and Ewing Hight. Varina taught English and music at Grand Prairie High School for many years. She was also in charge of the Devotional Committee. Lottie Liggett Reeves was also the daughter of George and Dina. She, too, was an early educator, teaching fourth grade at Austin Elementary until she retired. Faucher’s brother was George Daniel (Dan) Liggett who helped maintain the family farm and then later became an award winning salesman with Nabors Trailers in Dallas.

Two descendants of the Liggett family still live in Grand Prairie. Carol Ann, your author, Liggett Bell, and her son, Joe Anderson

The Grand Prairie Historical Organization's purpose is to search out, record, collate, preserve, and pass on to the next generation, the history of Grand Prairie, Texas, and its Southwest Dallas County environs, including the appropriate marking of authentic historical sites.

The dues year of the Organization shall be from January 1 in each year through Dec. 31 of the same year. The following classes of membership apply:

Regular Membership: The annual dues for single members shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00) and twenty-five (\$25.00) for couples .

Life Membership: Any person 45 years or older who contributes \$200 shall be a member for life without further payment of dues.

Gold Star Membership: Payment of 10 years in advance, \$150 (no age limit).

Patron Membership: Any person who contributes five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or more to the Organization shall be a Life Member thereof and shall, in addition thereof be appropriately recognized as a Patron of the Grand Prairie Historical Organization.

Corporate Membership: Any small business that contributes \$250.00 shall be classified as a corporate member.
